The President's Letter

This month, for perhaps the 24th time in the history of the UUCSC, one president's term ends and another's begins. The cycle of our democratic process continues. Hallelujah. But before I add Amen, I wish to take one last opportunity to share some thoughts as I look back on these past two years.

It was difficult at times, rewarding at others and never boring. The office of president is a visible one, especially when questions and problems arise. Who do you call? "Call the president, he should know." Sometimes I did know, and sometimes I did not know. Some answers were wellreceived, and some were not. Sometimes I had no answer. Sometimes I just broke down and cried.

Our first year of Interim was difficult, our second much smoother. As a congregation we did a lot of growing up in those two years. After many years of relative calm with our first settled minister, we developed a pretty high opinion of ourselves. I think the past two years have taught us many lessons, if we are willing to embrace them. I have come to realize we are just a bunch of regular folks who are abundantly human. When we place the welfare of our congregation ahead of our own personal agendas then we can accomplish great things. It all goes back to practicing those Seven Principles. Our unique strength lies in our ability to get back to that solid philosophical and spiritual base and work as a team in making the world around us a little better place.



As president, one does stand on a larger stage, and the attention can be seductive. Thankfully I am blessed with a partner whose wisdom and honesty supplied much needed reality checks, especially when my ego tended toward over-inflation. For that I am grateful. Thank you, Linda. I must mention that while the presidency carries its share of demands and duties, at least there is recognition when things are going well, and often there is an appreciation for one's efforts when they do not go so well. For one's

spouse, there is no such visibility or appreciation, but at times the demands upon her or him are just as great. It must be very hard to see someone you love struggling with complicated and emotionallycharged situations, and have little ability to change it. Perhaps this term ends with a double Hallelujah!

Let me end with a grain of wisdom encapsulated in a sentence fragment: "One on two." It is the basic rule for stacking dry stone walls. During the Pleistocene era of some 20,000-plus years ago, the Laurentide ice sheet didn't leave a lot of stones where I grew up in New Jersey, so stone walls were not part of my environment until we moved to Kingston Hill. My fascination with them drew me to reading about their construction. Our yard has a few hundred feet of walls in varying states of disrepair, so I gained some practical experience over the years re-stacking. These walls are laid-up dry wall, and have no mortar. Only gravity holds them together. If stacked correctly, they last hundreds of years. The stones themselves are quite impervious to the elements, and gravity is always present. The key lies in laying down the very first stones in a continued on page 6

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stable manner so as to make a solid base for the next layer of stones. The stone above is placed so it straddles two stones below, hence my mantra, "one on two." This gives the stone extra stability by relying on two supports. The wall dation for the next. The force is built with the sides sloping slightly inward so that gravity is pulling each side toward the other. If stacked well, a laid up stone wall exists in a state of

dynamic tension. And it exists for a long, long time.

Each year we lay down another layer of history of this congregation. We must do it with care, remembering that what we do one year is a founof our convictions, and our desire to make things better in our world, are the forces that can hold us together.

But like a stone wall without

a good foundation, those same forces can pull us apart. So far, we have seen some times when some re-stacking was neces-

sary, but over-all, the wall is coming along just fine.

I leave my stones for those who follow. I hope I have positioned them well.
