Introducing children to nonviolence

In June of 2015, I was fortunate enough to spend two weeks at the University of Rhode Island Nonviolence Summer Institute learning about the nonviolence principles and techniques used by Dr. Martin Luther King during the civil rights movement. This was a profound experience as I shared the classroom with folks from all over the world, some from communities struggling with significant violence.

The Six Principles of the Peaceful Community

- 1. Nonviolence is a way of life for brave people.
- 2. The Peaceful Community is the goal for the future.
- 3. Attach problems, not people.
- 4. Know and do what is right, even if it is difficult.
- 5. Avoid hurting the spirit and body of yourself and others.
- 6. The world is on the side of justice.

These nonviolence principles can help shape societies, classrooms, and even families! Local 5th grade teacher Robin Wildman has adapted the Kingian nonviolence principles for grade schoolaged children. It is these peaceful principles that we share though out our RE learning.

During the April school vacation, April 18 through 21, children in grades 4 through 8 can learn more about these principles during Peace Camp here in our own RE space. I will be in charge of the camp. For more information about this wonderful opportunity, please contact me at pamsantos@room35.com.
