Small group ministries are coming! Small Group ministries are coming!

Sometime this winter, likely in January and February, we'll test run an eight-week Small Group Ministry format. This is nothing like the covenant groups that some of you have participated in; for those who don't know, a covenant group is a set group of individuals with an established format (chalice leading, topic for the day, and a process for each to share) that meets on a set time frame (e.g., every other week).

This isn't that.

What we're trying is a model used elsewhere, one that is intergenerational, with a shorter time commitment, and the sharing of food. Sound good? Then read on . . .

This is an eight-week format. We'd begin at 6:00 p.m. with a shared potluck. At 6:30 we'd disperse to one of four classes offered by you and myself, with one for children as well. Childcare would also be available. At 7:30, we would come back together to share potluck dessert and clean up together. At 8:00, it's off to home.

There are several possible classes, including lessons of less, meditation with a concentration on the work of Pema Chodron, "'how to pray," and more.

I hope as many of us as possible choose to be part of this. This format creates opportunity for linkages between generations, fosters opportunities for now connection and friendship, and allows us seekers new ways to explore the world.

If this sounds good, and you want to be part of the planning team, do let me know.

And if you have knowledge or ideas to share, I welcome that as well!

Important news about our coming service trip to Puerto Rico

The visit from Steve Boisert, Director of Community Collaborations International, on Sunday, September 16 energized the trip planners and inspired more people to sign up. Here are some of the details:

 \rightarrow The trip is planned for April 13 through 20. We will return home in time for Easter, but we'll be in Puerto Rico to enjoy some of the Easter preparations.

 \rightarrow The cost is \$895 plus the airline ticket. We're working to charter a group flight. Everyone 13 and older is welcome. If you're 80 and asking, "Does this include me?" the answer is "Yes!"

We're also reaching out to recently-bridged senior youth and other local UU congregations. A dozen people have signed up, and we're hoping for a group of 20 to 30. If young people want to bring a friend from school, you're welcome to do that.

The \$895 cost covers all expenses, including food (vegetarian options will be available), sleeping accommodations, and transportation.

 \rightarrow The work will be varied. There will be opportunities to work with youth at a Boys and Girls Club, assist in native plant restoration, help repair structures damaged by Hurricane Maria, and much more. Specific types of work cannot be promised in advance, but Steve assures us that he'll split us into teams based on skill, need, and ability. Everyone will have an opportunity to make a meaningful contribution.

While the focus will be on work, we will also have some time to enjoy the gorgeous Puerto Rico beaches, see Old San Juan, and maybe visit one or two other locations of cultural importance.

 \rightarrow The weather is not likely to be extremely hot and humid. Steve says April is typically mid-80s and breezy.

Responding to the Changing Pastoral Needs of UUCSC

For years, this growing congregation has lovingly cared for its members through illness. In particular, the leadership of Judi Marcy and Penny Hall (and likely others unknown to me) have kept the Pastoral Care Team and Caring Connection going for years.

But it became clear, at least a year ago, that the leadership and many of the committee members had served amply and had a right to move on to other interests. In fact, UUCSC bylaws specifically limit committee chair terms to three years. So, with deep gratitude for the work done, but a sense of change needed, we— Cindy Berry as Pastoral Care chair, Judi as Caring Connection chair, and myself—agreed that these committees would be retired as soon as I figured out next steps.

As I sat with other UUCSC leaders to explore this further, a few themes emerged:

- ! At times, the expectations of our ill members or friends were more than we could address;
- ! Similar questions emerged, again and again, about resources for food, low income housing, and the like; and
- ! What '"support" looks like is unclear— is it sitting with someone in the days leading up to death, or bringing food, or something else entirely? And sometimes, we unintentionally got too involved in other peoples' lives, trying to fix family dynamics outside of our control.

With this understanding, we can move forward. I am beginning to ask some specific individuals to serve on a reformatted Pastoral Care team. A Caring Connection will not be recreated.

The new Pastoral Care team will:

- ! Support the minister in visits to the ill and housebound as requested to provide "ministry of presence," something they will be trained or re-trained for;
- ! Meet with the minister as needed;
- ! Work with the minister to invite a panel of local resource experts for a post-worship workshop (date to be determined) so that all might know of local resources.

We will not be providing meals in the same way as in the past, as this isn't sustainable for a congregation of this size. Going forward, upon request, UUCSC will provide three meals after a hospital stay or severe illness of a member or friend. *If you are interested in providing meals, please send an email to Rev. DL or Karen St. Peter noting your interest. Rides to doctor appointments will be something that individuals might work out between themselves, but will no longer be a centralized function. All pastoral care needs should be communicated to Rev. DL or a member of the new pastoral care team (to be announced shortly).*

Some might hear this as a pulling back of care. It is actually the opposite. As we free ourselves from some of the ways the work has become overwhelming, we will be better able to care for all UUCSCers. There is always more need than can be congregationally provided. With some clear guidelines in place, all will have access to care.

"This Changes Everything" to be shown on Tuesday, October 16

What if global warming isn't only a crisis? What if it's the best chance we're ever going to get to build a better world?

That's the question posed by Naomi Klein in "This Changes Everything," the 2015 documentary film based on her book of the same name.

Directed by Avi Lewis, this 90-minute film presents seven powerful portraits of communities on the front lines of fossil fuel expansion all around the world, from Montana's Powder River Basin to the Alberta Tar Sands, from the coast of South India to Beijing and beyond. Throughout the film, Klein builds to her most controversial and exciting idea— that we can seize the existential crisis of climate change to transform our failed economic system into something radically better.

This free community screening will be held at UUCSC on Tuesday, October 16 at 7:00 p.m. A brief discussion will take place after the film and will include updates about the fracked-gas projects in Rhode Island and other opportunities to take action.

News from the Social Justice Team

The Social Justice Team has several committees and task forces whose members concentrate on specific social justice initiatives. The committees and task forces met during September to discuss future projects, and are now working to implement those projects.

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The **Immigration Committee** engages in social justice activities involving recent immigrants and undocumented people in Rhode Island.

Dorie and Tom Lawson have completed the first part of the training necessary to become Sanctuary hosts at First Unitarian Church in Providence. They will offer a forum to our members and invite representatives to explain this project, which offers sanctuary to undocumented people.

The **Racial Justice Steering Committee** coordinates study and educational activities to deepen understanding of oppression.

Members will attend South Kingstown Housing Authority meetings to better understand the tensions between residents and the Authority. The Authority meets on the fourth Monday of each month at 364 Curtis Corner Road in Wakefield. Contact Carolyn Hurdis at <u>churdis@gmail.com</u> for more information.

The **Disability**, **Accessibility and Aging Committee** assures that UUCSC is a welcoming congregation for individuals who experience differences in emotional, physical, and mental well-being and aging.



Committe members have reviewed several accessibility and inclusion issues during the past year and a half, including access

from the parking lot to the front doors, the need for large-print hymnals (two are on order), and the audio system in the sanctuary, which is too loud for folks with hearing impairments and not loud enough for folks sitting in the back. Committee members continue to wrestle with an approach to integrate everyone with challenges into the coffee hour.



There are plans to buy an electric door opener for the door at top of the ramp. If folks can't get into the building comfortably, we are not accessible. The committee is investigating the UUA certification program and its benefits and challenges for accessibility and inclusion.

The Social Justice Team will meet on Thursday, October 4 at 4:00 p.m. in the Oneto Community Room. Committee leaders are encouraged to attend. The meeting is open to all congregation members.

Coleridge was an English poet, philosopher, and romantic visionary. Raised in an Anglican household, he became a Unitarian in his 20s. Josiah and Thomas Wedgwood, also Unitarians, supported Coleridge financially while he wrote his most famous works, including "The Rime of the Ancient Mariner," "Christabel," and "Kubla Khan." Coleridge was born in Devonshire, England on October 21, 1772.
