This is your gift to the world, and it is a huge one. You are kind, good, loving people. You act, live, and love in ways consistent with the words you profess. Most importantly, you are true to yourselves and those you encounter.

This year, you are the light, you are the gift at the end of a long journey.

And that is so much to be grateful for.

Welcome to the new UUCSC website

The previous website, which had served the congregation well for approximately seven years, was not mobile-friendly and had other limitations due to the template it used. The new website design allows the site to be read easily on your smartphone, tablet, or computer.

Much planning went into the development of the new website design—two years of discussion, one year of research into the best tools to use for website development, and at least five months of designing the new site. The site address is: https://uusouthcountyri.org/

All of the work for the new website was accomplished using volunteer hours from our UUCSC Communications Committee. Everyone helped!! We developed the site using WordPress with a DIVI interface, and we control updates, editing and management of the site, free of charge to the congregation.

Much care has been taken to use the most current information about UUCSC to develop the site, and to link it together logically for easy access. See the homepage screenshot below.



The Communications Committee realizes that websites are dynamic and must grow and change. Also, at this time, there may be information important for the site that is missing, or may not be exactly correct. If you identify something that needs to be changed or added, please let us know. When you visit the site, you will find lots of information can be available to you by clicking on linked words (shown in blue) and linked pictures. On your computer, when you scroll over each page with the cursor, if you see a hand icon, you can click on that word or picture and it will take you to more information about that topic. If you are using a smartphone or tablet with touch access, just tap any blue words or any pictures to connect to the linked information. Also, check out the upper and lower menu bars shown on every page of the website. Many links are there, including the UUCSC calendar, directory, and so much more.

Finally, if you can't find what you are looking for, click on the icon of the magnifying glass at the top of every page on the far-right, at the end of the tabs. This opens up a search box where you can type in what you want and click the enter/return key to find it. Enjoy exploring all that is on our new website. It's fun and easy!

Guest at Your Table

Guest at Your Table (GAYT) is the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee's annual intergenerational program to raise support for, and awareness about, key human rights issues. It is the UUSC's oldest fundraising and educational program for UU congregations. Here at UUCSC, this year's Guest at Your Table program opened on Sunday, November 24 and will continue through early January.

UUSC is proud to work with women leaders throughout the world whose experience and imagination embolden communities and inspires lasting change. Women lead half of UUSC's partner organizations. This year's Guest at Your Table theme is "Women Leaders, Strong Communities."

Highlighted this year are four inspiring women leaders from UUSC partner organizations who are transforming what freedom and justice look like in their communities.

Kiribati, a tiny nation in the central Pacific Ocean with a population of just over 110,000, has been severely affected by climate change. Frequent flooding is driving people from their homes. Human right leader **Pelenise Alofa** is the director of Live & Learn Environmental Education Kiribati. She travels to meet with communities in person, hearing about the issues they are facing and providing direct services. During these site visits, Live & Learn Kiribati staff install water tanks to increase access to clean water, help individuals build sea walls on

their properties, and advise them on how to advocate for their rights at the local level. They also collect stories to inform national advocacy efforts so that the government's response can be better informed by community experiences. Throughout these activities, Live & Learn emphasizes the importance of education and community-led programs. Pelenise explains, "They need to know they have a right to clean water, to food, and to protect their land."

Marta Velasquez is a well-known human rights defender— in Spanish, a defensora. She leads an all-volunteer feminist organization several miles north of San Pedro Sula in Honduras. "We started to build community feminism from the grassroots," she says, to make "women empowered and aware of their rights." Marta's group joined with other women's organizations in Honduras to form Foro de Mujeres por la Vida (Forum of Women for Life). Together, they work to empower women and eradicate gender-based violence, which is prevalent in Honduras and is one of the primary drivers of migration from Honduras to the United States.

At the age of 18, **WaiWai Nu** was imprisoned with her whole family in Burma (Myanmar). While in prison, Wai Wai met others who had been arrested unjustly and listened to their stories. Shortly after she was released at the age of 25, ethno-religious violence erupted with Islamophobic propaganda targeting Rohingya men, who were portrayed as violent threats to the country. Noting that the propaganda focused only on Rohingya men, WaiWai founded Women Peace Network, an organization that works to uphold the rights of women and minorities through advocacy, training in international law, peace-building education, and organizing meetings of Burmese civil society organizations.

Monica Curca is the founder and director of Activate Labs, an organization based in Washington, D.C. that brings art, music, and storytelling into spaces that migrants pass through en route from Central America, such as food kitchens, shelters, transit points, and border walls. Art supplies and boombox in hand— "ingredients for joy," as she calls them— Monica and her team from Activate Labs travel to these politicized and often-violent spaces with the goal of bringing peace and healing.
