Week 4: Listening to Diverse Voices

The UU faith has at its foundation the belief that every single person is important, deserves kindness and respect and should be treated equally and justly. It is the heartbreaking reality that this has not been the experience for non-white people in our country's history and even up to this present day. So as we explore the theme of Deep Listening, it's important to ask ourselves who historically has been erased from the national dialogue, whose voices are not being listened to still today and how do we bring those voices and perspectives into the center of our discussions and of our storytelling. So part of our newsletter this week includes stories from various perspectives and with a wide diversity of characters. And we continue the practice of listening by creating moments of pause and deep breath in our days. Plus, we are inviting you to reach out to the wider congregation this week and make a connection!

Gathering Together: Deep Breaths for Listening

In <u>this week's video</u>, we practice several ways to pause and take some time to feel grounded and centered to better listen to ourselves and to other people before responding. A good practice for all of us!

Stories for RE: The Importance of Diversity

This week, we celebrate the voices, stories and perspectives of a wide diversity of people: the brilliant tapestry of black, indigenous, latinx, asian, and middle eastern voices of our world.

To bring in more depth, we also offer this discussion point: compare and contrast these stories with a book on your own bookshelf that has only white characters. From the SoulMatters curriculum: "Help children be more conscious of how it feels to read stories that don't reflect who they are. And in particular, help them understand how <u>BIPOC</u> <u>people have been erased</u>." And also how some books misrepresent those under-represented communities.

- <u>The Day You Begin</u> by Jaqueline Woodson and read by the author is about how glorious it is that we are all a little bit different and how wonderful it is to share our own unique stories
- <u>Don't Touch My Hair</u> by Sharee Miller is about a girl who finally uses her voice and everyone listens
- <u>Dreamers</u> by Yuyi Morales is a gorgeous, lyrical book about a mama and her baby finding hope and a voice (and a library!) in a new land

Mindful Moment: A Powerful Pause

When we hear something hurtful or when we feel defensive, taking a moment to pause can make all the difference in our ability to respond with loving kindness. I've found that practicing this every day is a vital way to bring a body back to center, to calm the nervous system, and to be ready to respond to life's challenges from a place of grounded compassion.
